Workers are the backbone of California's agricultural economy. They have the right to safe and reliable transportation to their jobs; vanpools provide an essential service to agricultural

laborers. For these reasons, we respectfully request the creation of a statewide agricultural vanpool grant program that would enable entities to compete for funds to purchase and maintain agricultural vanpools, along with a \$6M allocation of Cap-and-Trade revenues to this program for fiscal year 2017-18.
